The Board approved the purchase of new umbrellas. They are an updated style and material and have a more conventional tilting mechanism. We hope you enjoy them!

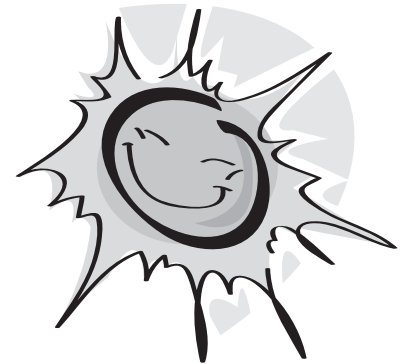
Our Lifeguard Veliko

Children playing are a joy to watch. However, a child on a bike is no match for an SUV.





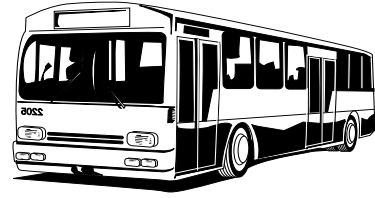
Trash Disposal

Residents of single-family detached homes and townhomes are reminded that trash containers may not be placed outside earlier than 5:00 p.m. on the evening before collection and must be returned to storage not later than 7:00 p.m. on the day of collection. Please put your trash can out of view on non-pick up days.

The regular trash collection day is Tuesday. During a week when Monday or Tuesday is a holiday, you may call the City's Office of Solid Waste at (703) 519-3486 or check the city of Alexandria website at <http://ci.alexandria.va.us> for information on trash collection.

TMP

Ever wonder what the Transportation Management Program (TMP) is? As a condition of approval for a multifamily development project, the City of Alexandria requires most communities



to participate in a city-wide program that promotes the use of mass transit. Part of our monthly assessment fee funds this program. As a bonafide resident of Quaker Hill, you are eligible to purchase certain mass transit media at a reduced price. The type of media, the pricing and how to obtain them are published in this newsletter. It is an excellent benefit of living in this beautiful community!

Transit media are available for half-price through the Quaker Hill TMP. The Program offers:

Major Pedestrian Accessibility Project

The Board is moving forward with the pedestrian accessibility project that will create a pathway from behind the townhouses on Quaker Hill Drive to the Alexandria Commons shopping center. The area is heavily traveled by residents; this traffic in combination with the steep slope has caused heavy erosion. The Board engaged a professional design consultant to address the complex issues presented by the topography, location of utilities (lines and boxes), limited space, severe erosion, pedestrian traffic, and trash

can paths. The new design will incorporate a gently sloping concrete-paver walkway with wide, low-rise steps (for both pedestrians and trashcans), drainage swales, bio-retention areas, and plantings to help control water erosion. The Board opted to have short railings at each step to provide pedestrians with a hand-hold to help pull trashcans up the steps to the curbs. The Board will be soliciting bids and hopes to have the walkway completed in the fall.

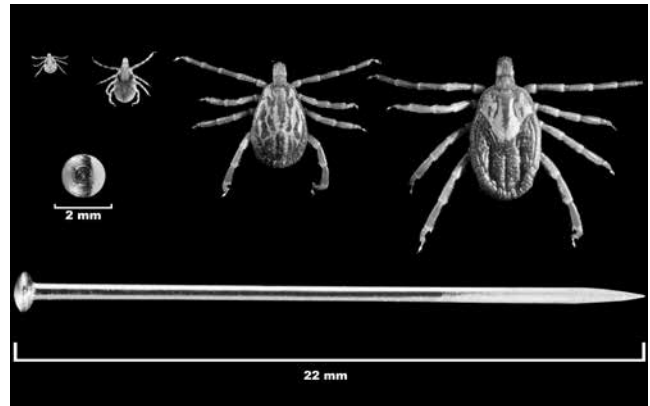
Pets

At Quaker Hill, we love our pets. Stand by the pond on any summer evening and watch the endless parade of dogs of every variety walking around the pond. For a dog lover, it is wonderful. However, sometimes those walks may present risks to our canine friends.

While fleas aren't currently a problem in our community, ticks can show up even in the best neighborhoods. Ticks can be found in our pond, front yards and courtyards, and in nearby neighborhoods. Squirrels, chipmunks, and even dogs bring these parasites into our community. They lay in wait for weeks and can latch on to a dog even during the coldest of days. Diseases carried by ticks can prove fatal. Lyme disease is the most documented, but others are just as deadly to both dogs and their human companions.

Prevention is the answer:

✓ Avoid tall ornamental grasses and other long grasses;



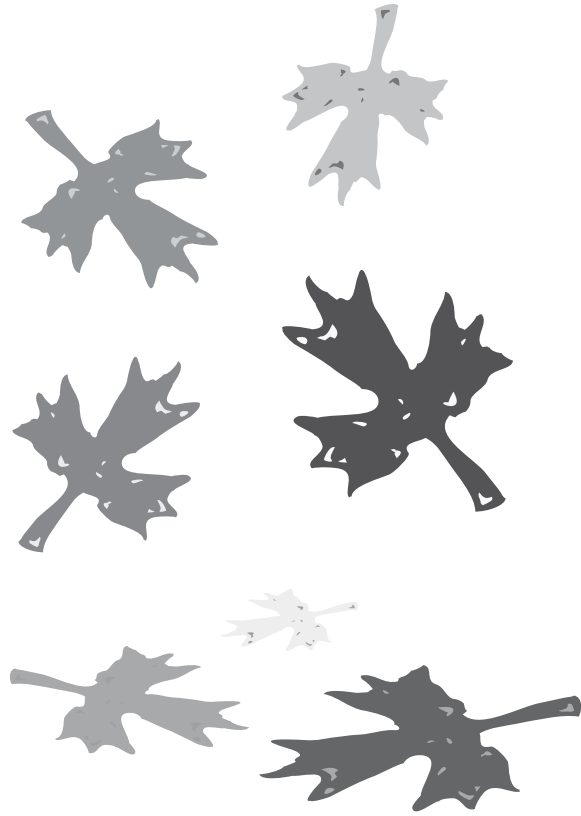
- ✓ Use a six-foot leash (easier to see what your dog is doing and to clean up after);
- ✓ Check your dog after every outing; and
- ✓ Use the appropriate monthly topical treatments.

Following these steps will keep your pet healthy and happy.

Community Note

Many Quaker Hill residents have observed and inquired about the presence of a security guard in front of the condos for much of the past winter and spring. Our recent record breaking cold winter was the reason. The low temperatures caused a number of pipes to burst in the condos, including those in the sprinkler system. The attic and other various parts of the system also needed major repairs. While the system was down, the insurance company and the Alexandria Fire Marshall required the presence of dedicated persons keeping a fire watch.

Replacements of the damaged portions of the sprinklers are now completed, and the fire watch has ended.



Yard Waste

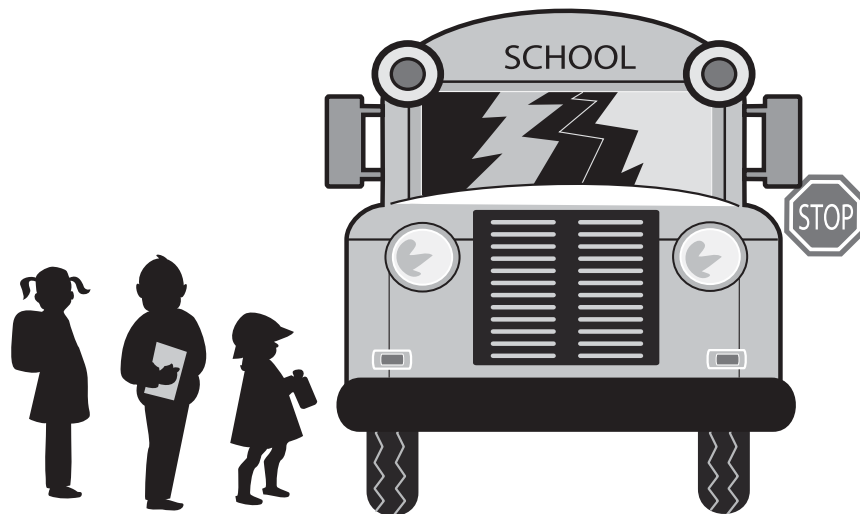
The City collects yard waste during regular collection days and by request. Yard waste includes grass, leaves, and brush and branches less than 10 feet long and less than 18 inches in diameter. Alexandria processes the yard waste to create compost or mulch.

Place your yard waste into a rigid/reusable container or paper yard-waste bags and put them next to your refuse containers. Bags must weigh less than 45 pounds. Dirt, sod, stumps, rocks, and stones are not acceptable; residents must arrange for private disposal of these items. Material placed in plastic bags will be thrown away as trash and not composted.

Larger branches and logs that are too heavy or bulky to fit in a container will be collected curbside by request. Place these materials curbside at least 10 feet away from parked cars. Use “Call. Click. Connect.” on the City website (www.alexandriava.gov) to schedule a pickup.

Under no circumstances should your yard waste be deposited in common areas.
